Workshop Discussion Topics & Key Questions

The following are some initial discussion topics and key questions:

- 1. **Economics:** What are the economic forces driving development on Division, within other transitioning local business districts, and in Portland currently?
- 2. **Sustainability:** What creative opportunities can we pursue for more shared, resource-efficient design and operation in new and existing development on Division? How can developers and partners help support a more Sustainable Southeast and a "living corridor" on Division? What barriers and opportunities exist? What activities, tools or resources are needed?
- 3. **Affordable Housing:** What are the barriers to and opportunities for including more affordable housing in future development projects on Division?
- 4. **Affordable Retail:** How can we preserve some more affordable retail spaces to provide opportunities for startups and legacy businesses on Division and other corridors?
- 5. **Preservation:** What opportunities and barriers exist to preserving special places and historic or culturally important buildings on Division? What further tools are needed?

Workshop Goals & Potential Outcomes

- Identification of barriers and opportunities related to affordable, green development and adaptive reuse on Division Street and in the City of Portland
- Increased neighborhood and community understanding of the current economic realities and potential impacts of future development scenarios on/near the Division Corridor
- End of Meeting Recommendations re: creation of meaningful opportunities for the community to engage in design issues and possible implementation strategies for the Division Design Guidelines
- Recommendations for tools and resources to include in design guidelines appendix and or future Toolkit for Neighborhood Design proposed by the Division Design Initiative (grant under review by MMT).
- Design and planning recommendations that may inform the Comprehensive Plan, mixed use zones work, and other policy and program activities, etc.
